# Detention Pilot: (3<sup>rd</sup> May – 27<sup>th</sup> May)

After consultation parents, pupils and staff stated that they did not feel punishment exercises were effective.

Therefore it has been decided to run a pilot using detentions as a sanction.

# Detention Pilot: (3<sup>rd</sup> May – 27<sup>th</sup> May)

Two Detention Hubs located either end of school in M16 and U27

Two members of staff per Hub. Maximum of two duties per teacher.

# Detention Pilot – How Does It Work?

Teachers will refer to the Craigie High School expectations as much as possible.

If a pupil chooses to misbehave they will receive:

Behaviour Checks: Warning, Demerit, Detention (Pupil must be informed)

Professional Judgement will be used by teachers. Serious misbehaviour will be dealt with accordingly.

The detention system will also be used to cover Homework and late coming.

# Detention Pilot – How Does It Work?

At the end of the school day, the office will compile a list of pupils with detention.

This list will go into all teacher's pigeon holes that night and then added to the staff and pupil bulletin.

House Tutors read out the list of pupils on detention to their class and send them to appropriate detention Hub.

Note: It will be P2 teachers once 33 period week starts.

Pupils then get marked present at detention by teacher on duty.

Office generates group call for all pupils on detention to inform home.

# Detention Pilot – How Does It Work?

*What about the pupils who choose not to go to detention?*

The responsibility is on the pupil.

If a pupil chooses not to go to detention he/she will be marked absent. They will then be picked up by SMT for a 20 minute lunchtime detention.



# Detention Pilot – How Does It Work?

*What about pupils who get more than one detention in a day?*

Any pupil who receives 3 or more detention demerits in a day will get break time and lunchtime detentions the next day.

# Detention Pilot – How Does It Work?

*What do pupils do in detention?*

Pupils will be given a reflection sheet with the following questions:

- *Due to your choices, which teacher placed you on detention?*
- *Why were you placed on detention? (Link to classroom expectations)*
- *How has your behaviour choice affected you and others?*
- *How can you do things differently in the future?*

*They will then copy out the definitions of our values.*

# Detention Pilot – How Does It Work?

*What about pupils who are disruptive on detention?*

Pupils will be reminded that if they do not satisfactorily complete interval detention they will complete a lunch detention.

SMT and PTG will also be available during detentions to assist with any problems.

# Detention Pilot – Prior to pilot starting

All pupils will get informed of changes during assembly.

The first period of week one of the pilot, pupils will get generic PowerPoint to remind them of the expectations and the consequences.

This will be P1, Tuesday 3<sup>rd</sup> May.

# Detention Pilot – Next Steps

An evaluation will be conducted during week four of the pilot.

This will assess the impact, positive or negative, that the detention system has had.
